**HVAC Systems: The Lungs of Center-Point Urbana's CSD** By Mr. John W. Elkin, Assistant Superintendent

While building and district improvements are a never-ending process, one vital area to always pay attention to lies in the HVAC arena. HVAC stands for heating, ventilation, and air conditioning and refers to the systems that regulate and move heated and cooled air throughout our school buildings. Simply put, HVAC typically isn't something people think about much... until it's not working!

It's an obvious statement to make that the age of the district's buildings range from older (Middle School) to newer (High School) and in that same vein, so are the complexities of the CPU's ongoing maintenance of our HVAC system. One major (of many) roles of mine as the Assistant Superintendent is to collaborate closely with both our Maintenance Director, Mr. Will Engelbrecht, and outside vendors to essentially keep HVAC both safe and working. Such that, on behalf of the district per my role, I wanted to share out the high level/major improvements and actions regarding our HVAC systems that have occurred since 2021-22:

#### Primary

• EMC conducted an air quality assessment (in 2020-21); samples were collected in the classrooms to determine if airborne mold spores are present. <u>All results came in below all</u> <u>recommended benchmarks</u>.

- · Recommissioning of all HVAC systems including comprehensive action plan.
- · Replaced 18 non-working rooftop exhaust fans.
- · Purchased 4 commercial-grade dehumidifiers.

#### Intermediate

- · Exploration on replacing the mammoth rooftop unit.
- · Replaced boiler pump motors (used to move hot water to heat building).

#### MS

 $\cdot$  Replacing boards and control for rooftop system for heating and cooling for new MS addition.

· Replacing several compressors to ensure efficient and consistent cooling.

Like most of you reading this article, I also have children that attend school in CPU (mine are in 5th and 7th grade). Therefore, as both an employee/leader and parent in the CPU CSD, safety and security—be it for locked entrances or air quality—are essentials for all students and staff. The HVAC systems—along with many other topics—are constantly being assessed and addressed in order to best serve all students, staff, and stakeholders.

#### Grading Using Standards-Based Learning

The primary purpose of reporting on standards in the Center Point Urbana Middle School is to

- communicate achievement status of standards to students, parents, and others.
- report separately responsibility, organization, and other citizenship skills.

The secondary purpose of reporting on standards include

- providing feedback to students for growth.
- encouraging student progress.
- Self-monitoring of learning.

Foundation practices of Standards-Based Reporting

- Practice, in or out of the classroom, is important for the understanding of standards. The purpose of practice is so that on an assessment the student can show that he/she understands a standard. Students are expected to complete practice with integrity.
   Practice assignments will not be included as part of the final report.
- Grades will be based on what the student is able to show he/she has learned. Therefore, extra credit will not be given at any time.
- Students will be allowed multiple opportunities to demonstrate their level of understanding of classroom standards in various ways. *Reassessments will be allowed for assessments.* If a standard is going to be assessed again later in the grading period, that will be considered their reassessment. Each teacher will have a reassessment policy. All students may reassess and will earn the most recent score.

#### Scale for Reporting Achievement on a Standard

- A Demonstrates thorough understanding of the grade level standard and can apply it
- B (Proficiency with the standard) Demonstrates understanding of the grade level standard
- D -Demonstrates partial understanding of grade level standard

F - With Help . . . Demonstrates minimal understanding of grade level standard

#### **Bus Expectations**

- 1. Sit in seat with feet out of the aisle.
- 2. Talk to the person in the seat, across the aisle
- 3. Talk in a voice level similar to the classroom
- 4. Stay in seat when the bus is moving
- 5. Stand up when the bus driver opens the door

Windows--need permission from the bus driver. The student who opened the window is responsible to put the window up when the student gets off the bus.
