# **Ongoing School Improvement Efforts (Part 2)**

As the Center Point-Urbana School District moves forward with continuous school improvement efforts related to student and staff learning, leadership is committed to supporting, strengthening, and enhancing staffs' effort for all things teaching and learning. This includes enhancing our collaborative structures, as collaboration is the engine that will lead to high levels of learning for all students. Specifically, the implementation of the PLC process is the framework that will allow us to enhance these collaborative structures.

Last month I provided a high level overview of what a PLC is and outlined the district's commitment to focus on learning. This month the focus is on the 3 Big Ideas of the PLC and how it will positively impact the district.

# The 3 Big Ideas of a PLC

Becoming a PLC is a process, as opposed to a program to simply put in place. Three guiding principles, also known as the three "Big Ideas", that steer the process are:

- 1. A focus on learning
  - a. The commitment to making student learning the fundamental purpose of the school.
- 2. A collaborative culture
  - a. Working collaboratively is neither optional nor invitational; every member of the organization is expected to work as a part of a collaborative team.
- 3. A results orientation
  - a. We acknowledge that acting on good intentions to help students learn is not enough; we must know if our actions actually lead to higher levels of learning.

The more the district can align its practices and procedures to these three ideas, the higher the probability that it functions as a PLC, and more important, the more its students will learn.

Next month, I will focus on the 4 Critical Questions that guide this process.

# Winter is Coming!

I've lived in the State of Iowa my entire life and despite the fact that our winters do seem a little "less" than they were when I was growing up, I have no doubt that the *real* cold, icy, and snowy weather will arrive sooner than later. Therefore, as a reminder, when the weather does come AND call for safety actions, here are the top Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) about Delays and Closings.

# Q: How will the district communicate a school closing or 2-Hour Late Starts?

**A:** Per our Communications Plan, these announcements will be announced through the following platforms:

- Campus Messenger Email and Text
- Official District Social Media Facebook @CPUSchools and Twitter @CPUSchools
- Media Outlets KGAN Channel 2, KWWL Channel 7, and KCRG Channel 9

# Q: When will a closing or 2-Hour Late Start be announced?

**A:** Generally, a decision is made by 6:30 am which means that information on school closings or delays should be available on our designated platforms between 6:30 and 6:45 am.

# Q. What time does my child's school start if there is a 2-Hour Delay?

**A:** No matter the day of the week, if a 2-Hour Delay is announced, the start times for each school are:

### Q: Where can I find my child's bus/transportation Hard Surface Only Plan route?

### Q: For a 2-Hour Late start, will breakfast still be served at school? And what about lunch?

**A:** No breakfast is served on a 2-Hour Delay as lunch is served soon after students arrive to all buildings.

# Q: For a 2-Hour Delay, does that apply to staff as well?

**A:** Yes, the 2-hour delayed start applies to CPU CSD staff members too. Staff should report to their buildings two hours later than they are usually expected. If a staff member has a question or concern, they should simply reach out to their immediate supervisor.

### IOWA STATEWIDE ASSESSMENT OF STUDENT PROGRESS (ISASP)

The ISASP is an assessment that is given to children in grades 3-11 every school year. It is aligned to the Iowa Core standards, so it gives us information for individual students, grade levels, buildings and the district. Since our teachers work very hard to align their instruction and assessments to the Iowa Core, we are confident that students will perform well on these assessments. We do however understand that these assessments are one snapshot into student learning. There are many more ways that we measure student learning on a daily basis. The assessments will be given to students the week of April 17th in the Intermediate building. The assessment blocks will be mostly during the morning, with an afternoon session for students who do not finish in the morning (assessments are not timed). Hopefully most appointments are able to be worked around this week of assessments for your child.

### THANKSGIVING FEAST

The first ever thanksgiving meal took place in the Intermediate took place Tuesday, November 15th. Since it was the first time doing a lunch event, there was some uncertainty of how everything from parking, payments to the flow of people would go. The Thanksgiving Feast was a wonderful time for a special adult in children's lives to come spend some time at school with them. Although there were a few things that we learned, it went very well! There are so many people to thank for this event going so well, that it is impossible to mention everyone. However, the Intermediate staff would like to thank Brenda Wyse and Mary Davis for a fantastic school lunch, Heidi Goettsch for coordinating everything through the PTO and Jenny Bearbower for coordinating everything within the school. Thank you to everyone who pitched in to make this a memorable day for the children.

### **READING MINUTES**

With parent input, there was a shift in the homework policy in the Intermediate a couple years ago. There was a zero homework policy (other than late work) until the parent advisory group voiced a concern about students not being prepared for middle school. The new homework policy has students responsible for some homework that gradually increases through the second half of students' fifth grade year. One constant has never changed is the expectation that all students read twenty minutes a night. Some of the benefits of reading nightly include improved concentration, discipline, language skills, creativity and cognitive development. Just as important, reading nightly can help you develop a bond with your child and help children develop a lifelong love of reading. Below are a few of the many advantages children who read nightly have over those who do not.

- If a child reads for 20 minutes every day, they are exposed to about 1.8 million words of text every year. That is 137 new words per minute!
- And this exposure makes children more likely to score in the 90th percentile on standardized tests. If you compare this to children who read just 5 minutes per day, they are more likely to score in the 50th percentile.
- It has been proven that only 6 minutes of reading can reduce stress by 68%. A good book teaches children to relax at bedtime.
- If families read together for 20 minutes a day, 7 days a week, they get more than 121 hours of bonding time every year!

Students at Center Point-Urbana Intermediate School have a weekly goal of 100 minutes. Depending on the month, children have a goal of 400 or 500 minutes of reading. Children who meet their goal receive a 20 minute time of an extra recess, tech or reading time each month.

Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) at CPU Primary

PBIS Is a system which the primary school utilizes to provide a tiered framework to support students through several areas of their academic, behavior, social-emotional, and mental health. The PBIS system promotes success for our students so that their lives are predictable, safe, and equitable. In the area of discipline, we use a matrix of major and minor offenses. As students progress, adults in the building determine if offenses are a major/minor. The student is then able to think through a process of restoring and "fixing" what went wrong, with the help of an adult. These are called "restorative practices." The PBIS team will meet several times throughout the year to continue to strengthen the tiered framework, and to actively pursue new areas of positive behavior for our students. As you think about PBIS at home, the bridge from home to school in the area of positive behavior can become very strong. As we practice being safe as well as being able to learn while at school, families can also promote these ideas at home. The ultimate goal is to consistently provide students with the tools they need to become successful students and future citizens.

# Thanksgiving Feast

The CPU Primary, along with the PTO, hosted the first Thanksgiving Feast on Thursday, November 17th. The students were able to invite one guest to the meal, with whom they dined to a huge dinner complete with everything imaginable on their plates. A huge thank you goes to all students, staff, and PTO members who coordinated, decorated, baked, delivered, set up, served, and welcomed guests and students. We look forward to many more events that bring together families, community members, the PTO, and our staff.
