

COMMUNICATION MATTERS

One major district goal this year–which has resulted in each building's goals–focuses on improving district communications (both internal and external).

The specific goals and indicators of success for CPU Communications are:

Board Focus

Increase technology use to allow free flow of information to provide an environment of transparency and trust.

District Goal

CPU will implement a proactive and consistent Communications Plan that employs a systemic platform framework, and measures the plan's effectiveness by using the SCoPE survey at the end of the year.

Indicators of Success

Develop and provide the Board with a communications framework.

Develop and provide the Board with roles, responsibilities, and action plans (including periodic action plan updates) as related to implementing the district communication plan.

Provide the Board with a SCoPE Survey analysis, intended to measure the communication plan's effectiveness (by staff, parents, & community members).

On a quarterly basis, present progress monitoring data on collective commitments, including intended next steps towards continuous improvement.

hile as the district's assistant superintendent– as all educators do–I have many roles and responsibilities and one of them is now serving as the district's Communications Coordinator; last year I became the district's interim Communications Director but because communications is more than one person, the role of "director" has shifted to each leader (principal, director, etc.) assuming lead for their entity while I maintain leadership, tacilitation, and coordination of the district's communications.

Much work, energy, and focus has gone into improving CPU's communications including accomplishing the following since the beginning of the school year:

- 1. Creating and implementing a Communications Handbook of which major recommendations derived from the 2019 NSPRA Audit that was conducted for the district. This plan includes defining roles and responsibilities, platforms used by CPU staff to communicate, and who is doing what.
- 2. Development, implementation, and launch of the district's new website, cpuschools.org. We currently are in Phase III - Improvement of the website which is part of the cycle of continuous improvement... as there is no "arrival" (end journey) to our communications.
- 3. Progress Monitoring: As part of the district's plan–and even more importantly–there's a saying that, "What gets monitored gets done." Since August, "Communications" is a standing agenda item on both district leadership (principals and superintendent) and department directors' consistent meetings. This includes follow-up training and live learning sessions and continual movement forward on how best to serve the families and stakeholders of CPU. This is also achieved through seeking their input and feedback as we have on–to name a few–Fall 2022 Parent-Teacher Conferences and the December 2022 Website Phase III survey.

On behalf of the district, we all appreciate your support as all staff continually improves and puts forth the effort to communicate to all stakeholders in an effective and consistent manner.

SCHOOL BUS STOP ARM

School bus stop-arm rules vary from state to state. However, drivers can use some basic commonsense practices to ensure that they are driving safely when school buses are on the roads.

First, slow down and be prepared for the school bus to stop. Above all, understand that the sole purpose of a school bus is to transport precious cargo, our children.

Secondly, school bus stop-arm rules are not just rules. They are laws! The purpose of these laws is to protect children.

School Bus Stop-Arm Rules for Amber/Yellow lights on Buses

When the amber lights are flashing, the bus driver is signaling that the bus will soon come to a complete stop to let students on or off the bus.

School Bus Stop-Arm Rules for Red Lights on Buses

Drivers must come to a complete stop if the school bus's red lights are flashing.

Violation Costs

Every time a driver violates the stop-arm, he or she is putting a child at risk. Every year, children die from stop-arm violations. Illegally passing a stopped school bus can carry a fine of anywhere between \$500 to \$1200, and the driver could also lose their license. Please take your time and be aware of your surroundings and everyone can arrive safely to school.

Money Saving Tips for your Student's Lunch Account By Brenda Wyse, Food Service Director

Check to see if you qualify for free or reduced meals. Click the following link: Free and reduced Meal information

If your student received free or reduced meals, remember that the meals are only free or reduced if they take a reimbursable meal. This means:

Breakfast: 3 items minimum/4 max, one of which must be 1/2 cup fruit, juice, or veg.

Lunch: 3 different components min/5 max, one of which must be $\frac{1}{2}$ cup fruit or veg.

If they just take a main entree they will be charged for it.

If they don't think they will eat it all, any non-perishable items can be placed in a share box offered at most of the schools.

Contact the food service department - bwyse@cpuschools.org if you'd like to impose any spending limits or restrictions on a la carte items. Please discuss this with your student, as we can not legally remove food from their trays and will subsequently need to charge for extras taken.

Happy New Year MS parents/guardians,

As we end our first semester at CPU MS I can't help but to reflect on all the great things our students and staff are doing in and out of the classrooms. The beginning of the school year seems like a long time ago, but our students and staff continue to do great things.

Here is a small list of highlights:

All of these are great, but I want to remind our parents, students, staff, and community that the most impressive part of CPU MS is the learning that happens everyday. Our staff is absolutely world class and we have high expectations for each and everyone of our students. Sometimes it is difficult to see the growth on a day to day basis, but make no mistake, our students learn at high levels. Continuous Improvement

This is my twenty third year at CPU. The question I get asked most by people is, "What makes CPU a special place?" My answer is simple, "The people in this community are amazing and the school district has always been driven to improve outcomes for ALL kids."

CPU Middle School is constantly working to improve. Our three goals (Big Rocks) for the 22-23 school year are:

1. Increase academic performance so that all students master essential standards, are provided extensions, and receive support in goal setting.

2. Empower students and staff by implementing the 7 Habits (Leader in Me) and Social Emotional Learning (SEL) competencies.

3. Increase external and internal communication by implementing our communications plan.

Please know that each of these goals are being monitored/measured throughout the year.

Our parent and community feedback is part of the process to improve. We will be asking for your input with surveys in the spring including the Measurable Results Assessment (Leader in Me) and Scope (communication) survey.

Please don't wait until the spring if you have questions or concerns about our goals. We want to be clear about our process and transparent with all stakeholders.

A great reminder to review Bus Expectations

Sit in a seat with feet out of the aisle.

Talk to the person in the seat, across the aisle

Talk in a voice level similar to the classroom

Stay in seat when the bus is moving

Stand up when the bus driver opens the door

Windows--need permission from the bus driver. The student who opened the window is responsible to put the window up when the student gets off the bus.

If your student has a phone, please remind them that they cannot listen or watch inappropriate content. It is also against our expectations to video or take pictures of another student without parental consent.

MS Schedule

Because we are always trying to improve, the middle school is exploring a schedule change for the 23-24 school year. I want to be transparent with you that we are in the initial phases of this. We have a team of middle school staff members that have been outstanding as they work through the challenges of change.

Our goals are to a) increase the amount of time our students receive core instruction b) provide common planning time for content teachers and c) ensure that our teachers that work in a co-teaching model have common planning time.



INTERMEDIATE

ISASP Assessment

The ISASP (Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress) is scheduled April 17th-21st. It is best if students are at school on those days to take the assessments with their class. These assessments are scheduled in the morning with time in the afternoon for students to finish if needed. Please do your best to avoid appointments on these days if at all possible!

Mrs. Fair and I will publish information in our newsletters about test preparation. We will start that soon in the Intermediate building so students do not feel extra pressure for these assessments. It is important that students feel confident, relaxed, and prepared to do their best. That message will be spread in the Intermediate building with some practice lessons (as soon as possible) that are on the Iowa Pearson Access website. Please be on the lookout for ways that you can help at home in future newsletters.

FAST Assessments

The Formative Assessment System for Teachers (FAST) is a set of assessment tools used by teachers to screen their students. The screening is done three times a year to help identify students who are on track to meet benchmarks by the end of the school year along with students who are at risk for not meeting those benchmarks. The Intermediate teachers will be screening students using the CBMreading assessment the week of January 15th. Teachers will also be giving students the aReading and aMath assessments during the month of January.

The CBMreading assessment is an oral reading fluency (ORF) screening assessment that gives teachers general information on their students' reading ability. Students who score below benchmark may already be in a reading intervention. If so, teachers progress monitor their words read correctly (WRC) weekly using a progress monitoring passage. If unsure of a student's needs and/or which intervention might fit the student best, diagnostic assessments may be given to give teachers more information.

The aMath and aReading assessments are computer adaptive tests (CAT) that assess multiple skills. The computer adjusts the items being given to students depending on their answers. It gives a more complete profile of students' math and reading abilities. The assessments help teachers make decisions for individual students. The assessments are also used to monitor the effectiveness of the core learning taking place. Teachers may make adjustments to instruction for all students in a classroom or at a grade level based on the results of the assessments.

Although the FAST assessments are very useful parts of the assessment system at Center Point-Urbana, teachers are continuing to improve the use of daily/weekly assessments to meet student needs in classrooms. Much of the professional learning that has been happening this school year (full days and 30-minute delays) has been focused on Professional Learning Community (PLC) work. Teachers have been choosing essential standards, unwrapping the standards, and creating unit planners with pacing guides. Part of this work is completing teacher-generated common formative assessments (CFAs). The CFAs will help teachers respond to what students have learned by providing extensions or interventions depending on student needs. These groups will be fluid (always changing), depending on each assessment. This type of work is already starting to happen in all three grade levels.

The final assessment done during the FAST assessment period is called SAEBRS (Social, Academic and Emotional Behavior Risk Screener). The SAEBRS assessment is a screening tool schools are able to use to identify students who may be at risk for social-emotional behavior problems. Teachers complete this assessment for their homeroom students.

The teachers in the Intermediate building have asked us to adjust schedules to start this work, even though it is something we were not planning on doing this school year. It is always impressive how quickly the staff in the Intermediate wants to jump in when they know a change can be best for their students. It is very appreciated!

Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day is one of the three school celebrations at CPU Intermediate. The other two class parties are Black & Gold Day and a Winter Break celebration. Most class parties are scheduled at the end of the day. Since Grandparent's Day is going to be scheduled the same day as Valentine's Day, the party schedule may look different at each grade level. Please keep an eye out for more information from your child's classroom teacher.

School Improvement - Intermediate Building

Each Center Point-Urbana School building has a school improvement plan for the 2022-23 school year. Although we have always had plans to continuously improve, the plans that are now being used help keep a focus on what is most important.

There are three main goal areas for the district this school year. They are to improve student achievement, student social emotional behavioral health (SEBH) and communication. There is a specific plan for each of these three focus areas along with a goal to continue working on and improving the culture in the building. Here are the the goals for the Intermediate building:

Culture - Promoting Positivity in the Building

Stronger relationships-staff to staff, student to student, staff to student. Teacher of the month Staff to staff positive recognition Fostering Resilient Learner book study Professional Learning Community implementation Continue PBIS work

Focus #1 - Student Achievement – To improve the percent of students who are proficient on FAST in math and reading by five percent (80% -> 85% proficient) & to improve the percent of 5th-grade students who are proficient on FAST in math and reading to 80%.

- Guaranteed viable curriculum
- Implementation of illustrative math in fifth grade
- Providing Tier II and Tier III instruction in the 5th Grade
- Implement research-based interventions.

Focus #2 - SEBH – To improve the "Adult-Student Relationship" percentage of students at each grade level to 85% or higher as measured by the Conditions for Learning.

- The Intermediate staff will become familiar with the SEL Core Competencies
- The SEL core competencies will be integrated into core curriculum
- Completing the Fostering Resilient Learner book study
- Continue to work on the PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) Action Plan

Focus #3 - Communication - By the end of the 2022-23 school year, 80% of CPU Intermediate families will rate their level of satisfaction with communication from teachers and the Intermediate principal to be very good or higher as measured by a survey from the intermediate office.

- Weekly grade level & specials Facebook posts
- Classroom newsletters 2x per month
- SeeSaw posts 1x per week
- Monthly newsletter from Intermediate office

Although there are more details within the school improvement plan, these are the goals and the main part of the plan for what is being done to reach each of the goals. This school improvement process will be done with the Intermediate Guiding Coalition (leadership group) in the future.

Bike Ride

Since we are past the first of the school year, it is time to start thinking about plans for the spring. It is important for all parents/guardians to know because many take the day off for this event.

The bike ride in the Intermediate building has changed multiple times over the years. To help get consistency for this event, the fourth grade is going to be the designated grade for the bike ride moving forward. In the years of experiencing the bike ride, third grade is a little on the young side. It might be good to come up with some activities to get students started riding their bikes proficiently and safely during the third-grade year. By the spring of fourth grade, students are much better equipped to ride a longer distance and are often transitioning to an intermediate-sized bicycle that is more suitable for a longer ride. The fifth-grade year will be used as a make-up year in case a bike ride event is canceled and cannot be rescheduled during the fourth grade year.

The date of the 4th-grade bike ride has not been scheduled yet. As soon as a date has been set, the information will be passed along to parents through this newsletter.

Winter Weather

Just a quick reminder...students go outside anytime there is not an advisory and the windchill is above 10 degrees. Below are guidelines of what is needed at school. Students may leave boots, snow pants, hats and gloves at school if it is easier for your family.

When winter weather occurs, children need to wear warm clothing. We go outside for recess unless the wind chill is below 10 degrees (we go out at 10 degrees and above) as children need fresh air and exercise. Please see that your child has the following:

Hat, scarf, earmuffs or hood Mittens or gloves Boots

Leg coverings (pants, tights, snow pants)

Winter coat
