Fun Facts

**Q: How wide and long is a school bus?**

A: In the United States, school buses are restricted to a maximum width of 102 inches and a maximum length of 45 feet.

**Q: How heavy is a school bus?**

A: A basic car weighs around 3,500 pounds. A bus is closer to 20,000 pounds, which is equivalent to 3 African elephants.

**Q: How many miles to a gallon does a school bus get?**

A: Depending on specifications, anywhere from 6 and 9.

**Q: How safe is the school bus?**

A: The NHTSA says that traveling by school bus is seven times safer than traveling by car or truck.

**Q: How are school bus drivers trained?**

A: School bus drivers are the most highly trained, tested and scrutinized drivers on the road. All school bus drivers must obtain a Commercial Driver's License (CDL) and must pass written and skills tests to obtain a School Bus Endorsement. Once they have their licenses, drivers receive specialized classroom and behind-the-wheel training in driving a school bus. All school bus drivers are required to participate in pre-employment, random and post-accident drug and alcohol testing, undergo frequent driving record checks, and pass periodic medical exams to ensure they are physically qualified. CPU drivers also must pass background checks prior to employment.

**Q: Why are school buses yellow?**

A: In 1939, representatives across the country gathered to debate how to standardize buses so they would be recognizable in traffic. Many different colors were considered, but the winner was the distinctive shade you know and love, which is officially called National School Bus Glossy yellow.

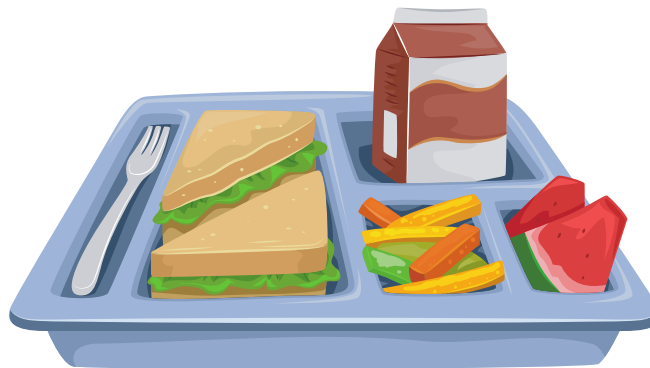
## National School Breakfast Week!

National School Breakfast Week is March 6-10. Eating breakfast at school is **convenient** - we are open at all schools for about a half an hour before school starts, **economical** K-5 \$1.70, 6-8 \$1.75, and 9-12 \$1.80, \$.30 for reduced price qualifying students and free for free qualifying students, and **delicious** - we offer a varied menu daily-click link- [menu](#).

School breakfasts play a big role in helping kids get the nutrition they need to learn, grow, and be healthy. The School Nutrition and Meal Cost Study\* showed that school breakfast is a big supplier of foods most kids don't eat enough of—whole grains, fruits, and dairy. The study also found that kids who eat school breakfast eat more of these foods than kids who eat breakfast elsewhere.

## Continuous Improvement

## Students & Staff Recognition

## Goals

CPU Middle School is constantly working to improve. Our three goals (Big Rocks) for the 22-23 school year are:

1. Increase academic performance so that all students master essential standards, are provided extensions, and receive support in goal setting.
2. Empower students and staff by implementing the 7 Habits (Leader in Me) and Social Emotional Learning (SEL) competencies.
3. Increase external and internal communication by implementing our communications plan.

Please know that each of these goals are being monitored/measured throughout the year.

Our parent and community feedback is part of the process to improve. We will be asking for your input with surveys in the spring including the Measurable Results Assessment (Leader in Me) and Scope (communication) survey.

Please don't wait until the spring if you have questions or concerns about our goals. We want to be clear about our process and transparent with all stakeholders.

## Bus Expectations

A great reminder to review Bus Expectations

Sit in a seat with feet out of the aisle.

Talk to the person in the seat, across the aisle

Talk in a voice level similar to the classroom

Stay in seat when the bus is moving

Stand up when the bus driver opens the door

Windows--need permission from the bus driver. The student who opened the window is responsible to put the window up when the student gets off the bus.

If your student has a phone, please remind them that they cannot listen or watch inappropriate content. It is also against our expectations to video or take pictures of another student without parental consent unless it's an emergency situation.

## MS Schedule

Because we are always trying to improve, the middle school is exploring a schedule change for the 23-24 school year. I want to be transparent with you that we are in the initial phases of this. We have a team of middle school staff members that have been outstanding as they work through the challenges of change.

Our goals are to a) increase the amount of time our students receive core instruction b) provide common planning time for content teachers c) increase the time our students receive science and social studies instruction d) have embedded time for Multi Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS)

## Parent Teacher Conferences

Our PTCs will be held on March 13th and 16th from 2-7:30pm. These conferences will be different from our fall conferences.

- Parents will have the opportunity to sign-up (online) with any of their students' core (Math, ELA, Science, Social Studies) and current Exploratory teachers (General Music, Wellness, Financial Literacy, Computer Science, Art, PE).
- Conferences will be held in the teacher's classrooms
- We encourage students to attend with their parents, but it is not mandatory.

Our hope is that this new format allows for our parents and teachers to connect at a deeper level and increase an already outstanding participation level. We had approximately 80% of our parents in the fall at conferences.

## LiMe Award

The Middle School Staff also honors our staff members at a monthly meeting in which two staff members receive a LiMe award (Leader in Me.) Our December and January recipients of the LiMe awards were Ms. Sara Floyd, Mr. Josh Helmke, Ms. Shane Wunder, and Ms. Katie Mallie. We have great people, doing great work, for great kids!

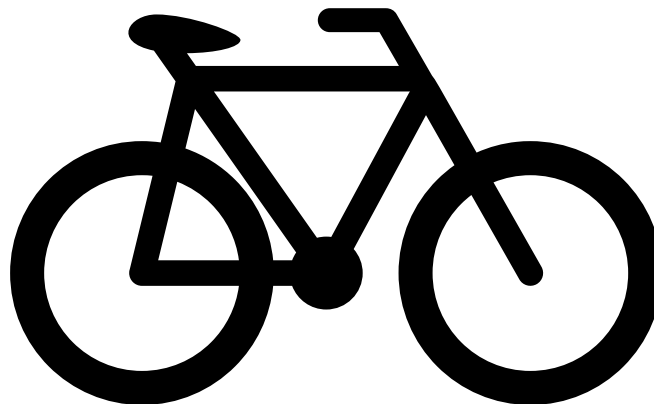


# Intermediate

## Bike Ride/Field Trips

The fourth grade bike ride has been scheduled for Friday, May 12th. Students will start the day in class. When it is time to leave, all riders will gather in the back of the building to ride to Center Point. Once at Fross Park, students will be able to use the park to play until lunchtime. After lunch, everyone will start the ride back to Urbana. All bike ride participants will need to wear a helmet. If you need a helmet or bike to use that day, please start by contacting your child's teacher. Our main goal is to create a fun experience for all.

All field trips, including the bike ride, may allow parents/family members to attend. Often space, especially when it comes to riding the bus, is limited. Teachers will communicate whether volunteers are needed or if parents may attend with their child. Anytime parents attend field trips/events with their child, they are required to fill out the volunteer application. This needs to be done once each school year. It was a great experience for the students to be able to spend some time with a special family member or two on this day. Over 350 family members attended the event. The time at each station went very quickly. A few adjustments were made on the day of the event and many things were learned to make it even better in the future.





# Intermediate

## End of 2nd Trimester

The end of the second trimester was Monday, February 27th. The elementary schools are divided into trimesters for a couple of reasons. Much of what is done in an elementary school is done every three, six or 12 weeks. Since a school year is typically 36 weeks, it works out very well to be divided into trimesters. As mentioned in the previous newsletter, schools do FAST testing three times a year. The first round is shortly after the beginning of the school year. The second round of FAST testing is typically done in January toward the end of the second semester. The final FAST testing will be done in early May.

Teachers use this data to meet the needs of students. The screeners make sure no one is falling through the cracks without being noticed. In between the screening assessments, teachers are providing core instruction and interventions for students. If students are below benchmark, the teachers are progress monitoring weekly. Interventions may be adjusted every three weeks, but teachers do meet about every six weeks to look at progress monitoring data and adjust interventions for students who are not making adequate progress or those who may no longer need an intervention.

The end of a trimester gives teachers an opportunity to report progress to parents. Many elementary schools have been standard based for quite a few years, meaning we are focused on students learning the standard by the end of the school year. Learning is a journey that every student may take a somewhat different road. The teachers work every day to make sure all students are learning the standards by the end of a unit and especially by the end of the school year. Some standards are taught 2-3 times a year to make sure they have been learned by all students.

Teachers are continuing to gather evidence of student learning to report to you. Report cards will be finished up and will be sent home with students Friday, March 10th. Parent teacher conferences are the following week (Monday March 13th and Thursday, March 16th). If you see something marked AC (Area of Concern) on your child's report card, that is an area you might want to focus on during your conference with the teacher. Standards marked P (progressing) are normal during the school year. It is quite possible this is something a child has not mastered/met yet, but it could be a standard that has not been fully covered in the classroom yet.

Your partnership with your child's teacher in helping them along this learning journey is greatly appreciated. We have the best families at CPU! The support teachers receive from the Center Point-Urbana Community does not go unnoticed.

## PTO Sock Hop

The PTO Sock Hop is scheduled for Friday, March 24th from 5pm-7pm in the Intermediate Gym/MP room. It is a fun event that the PTO puts on for Intermediate Students. Trick or Treat at the Primary is an event that the PTO puts on for younger students in the district. This is more geared for our older students in third, fourth and fifth grade.

The gym area is used for the dance. Parents are encouraged to come dance with their children. There have been some students/families who like to dress in 50s outfits. Many dress like they are coming to school. Children/families will dance to a variety of songs that may include some fun songs like The Children Dance, The Twist and/or The Limbo. The Sock Hop also has games such as Giant Jenga, Book Bingo, and Cornhold Bags. There is even a plan for a photo booth. There will also be raffles for prizes.

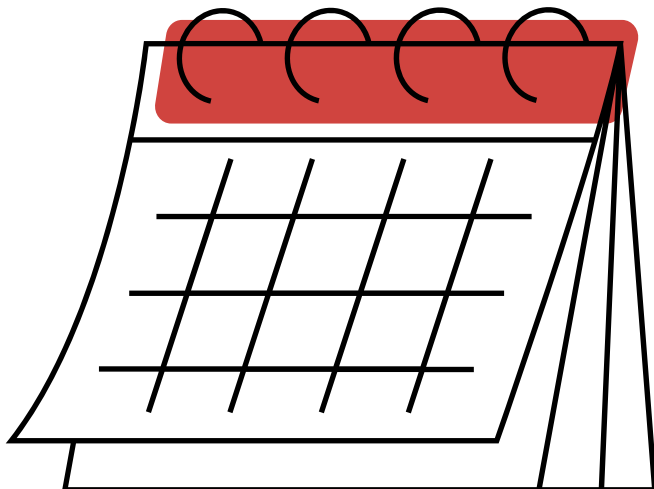
## Thank you to High School Students

# Activities Department

## How To Become An Official

Recent shortages in officials have begun to impact middle school and high school athletics. Information below provides details on how to become an official in the state of Iowa provided by the IHSAA.

### Qualifications

- Must be a high school student or older.
- A thorough understanding of the sport you wish to officiate.
- The ability to interpret and apply rules.

### Policies

- HS students are eligible to obtain a license and officiate junior high contests, but may not officiate senior high games (with soccer as the exception).
- An official is required to have a valid IHSAA license to officiate grades 7-12 between member schools in the sports of baseball, basketball, football, cross country, soccer, swimming, wrestling and track and field.
- All officials' licenses expire annually and are renewable for one year.

### Exams & Rules Meetings

- Officials must score 75% or above on an online open book exam in the sport for which they intend to officiate. Exams are available online approximately 1 month prior to the starting date of each sport.
- Officials are required to view an online rules interpretation meeting in their sport(s) before the season begins. Rules meetings are available online approximately 1 month prior to the starting date of each sport.

### How to Register

- From our website ([www.iahsaa.org](http://www.iahsaa.org)), click on OFFICIALS. Once that page opens, click on, "Online Registration Form for New and Re-Registered Officials".
- Fees - One sport - \$50
- Full-time college student or high school student - \$20
- Each additional sport - \$12

### Once You're An Official

- Directly contact the athletic directors at area schools expressing interest.
- You are strongly encouraged to become a member of a local officials' association where you can receive training, mentoring and assistance in obtaining game contracts. A list of associations can be found under the "Officials" tab of the website.
