### **Financial Report**

On October 27, the Board of Education received an overview of the 2020-21 financial report. During the 2020-21 school year, the District increased expenditures from \$15,193,317 during the 2019-20 school year to \$15,765,612. The increase in expenditures was expected due to an increase in staff and due to the shutdown during the prior school year. Revenues increased from \$16,347,000 to \$17,125,504 during the 2020-21 school year. This leaves the district in a strong financial position to start the 2021-22 school year. The Unspent Authorized Budget, which is the measure used by the State of Iowa to determine the amount that a district may spend, finished the year with a balance of \$4,794,956. A financial health report is available on the Board of Education home page at www.cpuschools.org.

### **Enrollment Report**

In the State of Iowa, all schools report student count data on October 1 of each year. This data is then used to determine funding during the following school year. Center Point-Urbana saw a decrease of approximately 25 resident students during this year's fall count. However, open enrollment into the district continues to increase, resulting in a net loss of 10 students that are educated within the district. CPU will continue to carefully monitor enrollment trends in the future.

### **COVID-19 & Vaccine Information**

The CDC recommends everyone ages 5 and older get a COVID-19 vaccine to help protect against COVID-19.

- The federal government is providing the COVID-19 vaccine free of charge to all people living in the United States, regardless of their immigration or health insurance status.
- Check with your child's healthcare provider about whether they offer COVID-19 vaccination.

Although children are at a lower risk of becoming severely ill with COVID-19 compared with adults, children can:

Getting a COVID-19 vaccine can help protect children ages 5 years and older from getting COVID-19:

- Vaccinating children can help protect family members, including siblings who are not eligible for vaccination and family members who may be at increased risk of getting very sick if they are infected.
- Vaccination can also help keep children from getting seriously sick even if they do get COVID-19.
- Vaccinating children ages 5 years and older can help keep them in school and help them safely participate in sports, playdates, and other group activities.



### Bird Count by Susan Edwards Richmond



November 15th was the first day of the professional learning course Blended Learning - The CPU Way in 2021-22. Participants began with a session to learn about the benefits of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) and implementation of blended strategies in the classroom. Future sessions will focus on identifying best practices in UDL and Blended Learning, but also taking a deep dive to explore the CPU District Pillars of Blended Learning and how to apply them in a blended classroom environment. By better understanding the components of the Pillars and the benefits of UDL, teachers will gain strategies and tools to support and meet the needs of ALL learners. Throughout all of the coursework, participants will experience a blended format to best serve all learner's experiences.

The substitute shortage made the Instructional Coaches (ICs) realize that providing professional learning during work hours while subs covered classes was not going to be an option this year. In a brainstorming meeting, Primary IC, Sarah Rieck, offered the idea of a course that offered the choice of taking it for credit or just to participate in learning with colleagues that would meet after school; the rest of the ICs jumped on board and the planning began.

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First off, the ICs understand the power of collaboration and designed a course that CPU teachers can learn face-to-face and share their teaching experiences and practice with Blended. Next, the ICs knew that Blended Learning underwent metamorphosis during the COVID years and was in need of a review and some new perspective. As the ICs planned the course, the idea of UDL became even more apparent, so the course was designed to introduce the deepen benefits of UDL and understanding participant's practice around blended learning models.

The planning and implementation of the course has been supported by Grant Wood Area Education Agency and consultants assigned to our district. (cont. on next page)





Digital Learning Consultant, Lynn Kleinmeyer, has had an integral part in the current planning of the course sessions, as well as a great thought partner for the ICs learning through a book study on UDL and Blended Learning: Thriving in Flexible Learning Landscapes, by Catlin Tucker and Katie Novak. ICs are also resourcing the webinars provided by Grant Wood AEA Digital Learning Team members Beth Swantz, who has also played a huge roll over the years in the district discussions of what blended should look like at CPU; Mindy Cairney, the digital consultant formerly assigned to CPU; Gina Rogers; and Amber Bridge.

The ICs are excited for our CPU teachers to have this in-house learning opportunity and look forward to the planning of the future sessions.
