DISTRICT OFFICE UPDATES

WHAT IS PPEL?

The Physical Plant and Equipment Levy (PPEL) is a source of funding used to support items such as technology, repairs, buses, and equipment. It is funded through property tax and is composed of two pieces; a \$.33/\$1000 levy that is approved by the Board of Education, and a \$1.34/\$1000 levy that is approved by the voters within the district for a period of up to 10 years.

These funds can be used for the purchase of equipment, transportation equipment and repairs, repair or remodel of existing facilities, purchase or lease of equipment, construction, and purchase of property. It can NOT be used for items such as salaries, heating and cooling, or other general education expenses.

At CPU, we have used our PPEL to fund items such as:

- Buses, vans, and other transportation equipment
- Yearly technology rotation, including Chromebooks, laptops, Ipads, carts, projectors, wireless network infrastructure, and servers
- Equipment
 - Tuba
 - Defibrillators
 - Microscopes
 - Commercial Freezers for Food Service
- Classroom furniture
- Software such as Powerschools, Simbli School Board Software, and Keep N Track
- Construction of the high school
- Construction of the bus barn
- Lawnmower, forklift, and other buildings and grounds equipment

The current voted-PPEL levy is scheduled to expire at the end of the 2022-2023 school year. Watch for more information regarding the renewal of the levy.

Halloween marks the start of the SUGAR TRIAD! Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas! During these holidays sweets abound! How much do you know about sugars and "added sugars?" Here are some great sugar points from the Mayo Clinic:

A few facts about sugar

All sugar, whether natural or processed, is a type of simple carbohydrate your body uses for energy. Fruits, vegetables and dairy foods naturally contain sugar.

"Added sugars" are the sugars and syrups added to foods during processing. Desserts, sodas, and energy and sports drinks are the top sources of added sugars for most Americans, but many other foods contain added sugars.

Why are added sugars a problem?

Foods with a lot of added sugars contribute extra calories to your diet but provide little nutritional value. In addition, added sugars are often found in foods that also contain solid fats, such as butter or margarine, or shortening in baked goods.

Eating too many foods with added sugars sets the stage for potential health problems, such as:

- Poor nutrition. If you choose sugar-laden foods instead of other, more nutritious foods, you miss out on important nutrients, vitamins, and minerals. Regular soda plays an especially big role. Sweetened soft drinks add lots of extra sugar and calories and no other nutritional value.
- Weight gain. There's usually no single cause for being overweight or obese. But added sugar might contribute to the problem. Adding sugar to foods and beverages makes them more calorie dense. It's easy to consume extra calories when eating foods that are sugar sweetened.
- Increased triglycerides. Triglycerides are a type of fat in the bloodstream and fat tissue. Eating an excessive amount of added sugar can increase triglyceride levels, which may increase your risk of heart disease.
- Tooth decay. All forms of sugar promote tooth decay by allowing bacteria to multiply and grow. The more often and longer you snack on foods and beverages with either natural sugar or added sugar, the more likely you are to develop cavities, especially if you don't practice good oral hygiene.

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Different names for added sugars

Sugar goes by many different names, depending on its source and how it was made. This can also make it hard to identify added sugars, even when you read ingredient lists and food labels.

Check for ingredients ending in "ose" — that's the chemical name for many types of sugar, such as fructose, glucose, maltose and dextrose. Here's a list of other common types of added sugars:

- Cane juice and cane syrup
- Corn sweeteners and high-fructose corn syrup
- Fruit juice concentrate and nectars
- Honey
- Malt or maple syrup
- Molasses

Despite what you may have heard, there's no nutritional advantage to honey, brown sugar or other types of sugar over white sugar.

How to reduce added sugars in your diet

To reduce the added sugars in your diet, try these tips:

- Drink water, other calorie-free drinks, or low-fat milk instead of sugary sodas or sports drinks. That goes for coffee drinks, too.
- When you drink fruit juice, make sure it's 100 percent fruit juice not juice drinks that have added sugars. Better yet, eat the fruit rather than drink the juice to get the fiber as well.
- Choose breakfast cereals with less sugar. Skip sugary and frosted cereals.
- Opt for reduced-sugar varieties of syrups, jams, jellies and preserves.
- Choose fresh fruit for dessert instead of cakes, cookies, pies, ice cream and other sweets.
- Buy canned fruit packed in water or juice, not syrup. If you do purchase fruit packed in syrup, drain and rinse it with water to remove excess syrup.
- Choose nutrient-rich snacks such as vegetables, fruits, low-fat cheese, whole-grain crackers and low-fat, low-calorie yogurt instead of candy, pastries and cookies.

Center Point-Urbana Community School is participating in the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Seamless Summer Option (SSO) for the entirety of the 2021-22 school year. This means that our school provides no-cost meals to all students. This program provides additional support and flexibility for our district to continue serving meals to children while maintaining safety measures and managing the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Included in the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic are nationwide supply chain and product availability shortages. Disruptions are due to a lack of availability of raw ingredients and labor to produce, unload, and transfer food products. Some food and/or beverage products normally provided to students may not be available or arrive as scheduled. Due to unforeseen circumstances, last-minute menu changes and product substitutions may occur. Be assured meals will remain balanced, healthy, and plentiful. We ask for patience and understanding as we do our best to meet the needs of your children.

ARRIVAL/DISMISSAL TIMES - INTERMEDIATE

Intermediate students go to their classrooms at 8:15 in the morning. Classes officially begin at 8:20. The end of the school day is at 3:20. Center Point bus riders are dismissed at 3:20. Students who walk home or get picked up by a parent are dismissed at 3:25. Any students who are waiting for siblings on the Urbana buses or ride the Urbana buses are dismissed around 3:40.

FAST ASSESSMENTS COMPLETED

Both the Primary and Intermediate buildings have finished the fall FAST Reading and Math assessments. Since the assessments, teachers have been analyzing the data and deciding on an instructional course of action. It will take students, staff, and parents to help students continue to grow in both the reading and math core content areas.

As the assessments get finished, the next steps will be to start interventions for students who are below the benchmark. The intervention groups will be starting as soon as possible.

The information below are percentages of students in that grade level who have met the state fall benchmark. Note: the winter and spring benchmarks are higher so the benchmarks change each testing period.

COUNSELOR UPDATES

CAREER INTEREST INVENTORIES: Interest inventories are a great way for students to begin career exploration and planning their post-secondary career goals. Interest inventories consist of a series of questions regarding one's likes and dislikes. The intent is to answer the questions with your gut reaction, whether you like it or not, not to sit and ponder if you like the task in certain situations. Upon completion of the inventory, you are given a list of careers that best match your interests based on the inventory results. With this list of careers, individuals can further explore what the career entails.

Throughout the school year, students will be taking one of two interest inventories (ASVAB Career Exploration or MyACT) and will be able to further the careers that their interest inventory results yielded. The ASVAB Career Exploration Inventory is a part of the ASVAB Career Exploration Program. The MyAct interest inventory profile is created by ACT and access to the profile and account are free.

With this intentional exploration and planning, our goal is that all students will have a clear picture of their future career goals and will be prepared to leave high school with a plan of how to achieve their career goals, whether through additional education, training, or apprenticeships. COLLEGE SEARCH PROCESS

Looking for the perfect college can be a daunting task. Here are some tips to help with the process.

- 1. Make a list. Make a list of everything you want in a college. This includes the majors that interest you, the extracurriculars (sports, clubs, organizations) you would want to participate in, location of the college (city vs rural, weather, etc), and the size of college. This list will help you narrow down college options later in the college search process.
- 2.Attend college fairs. College fairs are a great way to get a quick glimpse of what a college has to offer. College fairs are a one stop shop way to get a lot of information from a lot of colleges at one time. When you are at a booth for a college you can sign up to receive mailings from the college to get more information about the college as well.
- 3. Use College Raptor. College Raptor is a college search website. You can create a free account and get a list of colleges based on your individual fit. College Raptor provides a variety of information about colleges from the majors they have, the cost of attendance, and location. Visit www.collegeraptor.com to create an account or search for colleges.
- 4.Go to the college website. By visiting the website of the colleges that interest you, you will be able to find detailed information about the majors and requirements the college has, the financial aid they offer, the student life, and maybe even see a virtual tour of the college. You will also find contact information to speak with a college admissions representative.
- 5. Visit the campus. Getting on the campus of the colleges that interest you is the best way to get a feel of the student life on campus. You will be able to get a tour of the campus, talk with current students or even talk with a professor in your interested major area. Reading and finding information about the college is great, but actually being on campus will tell you what you like and don't like about that particular college. Visit the college website and contact an admissions representative to schedule your campus visit.
- 6. Pick your colleges. Once you have gathered all your information from the lists you made, the college fairs you attended, the website searches, and the campus visits, you will be able to make a list of all the colleges that interest you. At this time you don't have to pick one. From here, you can begin your college application process and apply to all the colleges that interest you.

SENIORS - FAFSA (FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID) INFORMATION

The high school will be hosting a FAFSA Completion Event on Monday, October 4 from 2 pm-7 pm. Iowa College Access Network representatives will be on-site and taking appointments to help any CPU family fill out and complete the FAFSA. Families wanting assistance filling out the FAFSA or wanting it completed for them can make an appointment.

Students and families hoping to receive aid (federal, state, or college) to help pay for college need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA determines a student's Expected Family Contribution (EFC) and then from there the eligibility for aid is determined. Many colleges/universities have priority dates for when the FAFSA needs to be completed for the student and family to be eligible for any aid to that institution. In Iowa, the University of Iowa and Iowa State University have the earliest priority dates of December 1st. For a full list of Iowa college and university FAFSA priority dates visit .

STORMIN' POINTER PRIDE

WHOLE KIDS FOUNDATION AND IOWA AGRICULTURE LITERACY FOUNDATION GRANTS

It was announced on August 3, 2021, that Center Point - Urbana high school and the Pointer Planters garden club had been selected to receive a \$3,000 grant from Whole Kids Foundation to expand their edible gardens on its campus and at Fross Park. CPU was fortunate to be chosen from over 1,400 organizations in the U.S and Canada who applied for the grant. Whole Kids Foundation's Garden Grant Program helps schools and organizations in the U.S., Canada, and the UK connect students to real food through edible learning gardens aimed at improving children's nutrition and wellness. Earlier, <u>Melissa James, high school science educator</u> and <u>Pointer Planters advisor</u>, also received a \$250 lowa Agriculture Literacy Foundation Grant, in February 2021. The grant was to fund four raised beds on school grounds to grow edible gardens within the botany class curriculum. The CPU district also provided funds so that a total of eight raised hoop house beds could be built. These beds will be maintained during the summer by the Pointer Planters.

The Pointer Planters have grown and maintained several raised beds at the Fross Park community gardens for the past three years under the guidance of adviser Melissa James and assisted by Beth Larson. The funds received from Whole Kids Foundation will allow the club and botany classes to obtain the appropriate equipment, tools, and storage needed to maintain both sets of gardens. It will also allow for the purchase of seeds and seedlings for spring, summer and fall plantings at both locations. The crops grown will be given to the students, school kitchen for student lunch and to the community for those who are food insecure. The students will learn about the various plants, conditions for growth, how to maintain the plants, harvest and prepare their harvest into meals. Providing these hands-on opportunities for students will foster an appreciation and understanding of where our food comes from as well as to empower our students to feed themselves and their communities in the future.









CPU HS MARCHING BAND BEGINS COMPETITION SEASON

What is an instructional coach!

The role of instructional coach originated through the Teacher Leadership and Compensation (TLC) System put in place in 2013-2014. One of the main goals of the TLC system was to put effective educators in leadership positions within their own building/district. CPU has an instructional coach at each of their four buildings: Ellen Popenhagen (High School), Sharon Vaupel (Middle School), Dani Kremer (Intermediate), and Sarah Rieck (Primary). Three years ago, CPU picked up a fifth instructional coach, Ann Rozek, who travels between buildings to work with new teachers and with teachers implementing Specialized Designed Instruction.

On any given day you will find these educators leading book studies, gathering/organizing research-based instructional materials, leading teachers through a coaching cycle, co-teaching, and overall, providing support to all teaching staff. As leaders, these instructional coaches are responsible for helping to analyze student data, collaborating in the lesson planning process, and providing opportunities for professional growth and development, thus improving teachers' instructional practices, which in turn, will have a direct impact on student learning.

To be in this Teacher Leadership position, instructional coaches must practice relationship-building skills and develop a data-driven perspective of working with teachers to recognize where the strengths and areas for improvement lie. Although instructional coaches and the principals of each building and across the district work closely together, it is important to note an instructional coach is not another administrator or an evaluator; their sole purpose is to provide support for teachers.
