Leadership Focus as the Next Superintendent: A Unified Vision With Staff, Families, and the Community To Ensure High Levels of Learning For All Students

I am honored to have been selected as the next superintendent of the Center Point-Urbana School District after serving in the role of Assistant Superintendent for CPU the past two years. While I “officially” begin my new role on July 1, I immediately began the transition process (as much as I can) including reflection upon my journey to CPU the week after I was offered and accepted this position. This transition has included (but not limited to) meetings with principals and learning certain logistics of the superintendent role.

My family, which includes my wife, Jamie, and two sons, Rowan and Grady, moved here two years ago because of the excellent reputation of the district including my research of its strong community support for both academics and activities. We also were aware of the experienced staff who are committed to excellence... whether that was demonstrated via the results of student achievement or what people I knew and trust told me about CPU.

All of this still rings true today. Yes, there have been significant challenges in education the past 3 years and our district has not been immune to these challenges, but because of the strong foundation that exists in our district, there is no reason why CPU cannot set the bar to be the best school district in the state!

The last 28 years I have served as an English teacher (9 years), high school assistant principal (7), high school principal (3), and middle school principal (7) before my current role. As a classroom teacher, I also was a TAG Coordinator for several years, served as the Newspaper and Yearbook Sponsor my entire tenure, as was both an assistant football coach and head boys' track coach; during the fall and spring seasons, I also was the Drama (Fall Play and Spring Musical) Director.

My leadership efforts will focus on a unified vision with staff, families, and the community to ensure all students learn at high levels. The foundation of this vision will align with the district's mission statement and utilizes the Continuous Cycle of Improvement as it focuses on:

- **Academics:** Provide a guaranteed and viable curriculum that provides quality and effective instruction to meet the needs of all students.
- **Activities:** Further bolster participation, success, and the promotion of student activities to connect students, families, and the community as well as to expand school pride.
- **Communications:** Communicate proactively, consistently, and effectively with all stakeholders to build and sustain an environment of trust and transparency.
- **Healthy Culture:** Maintain a productive, safe, secure, and celebratory culture. This also includes matters of equity for all students, staff, and families.
- **System Alignment:** Fortify and/or improve the interconnectedness of all district systems which directly or indirectly impact student learning.

I'm excited for this opportunity and look forward to leading the collaborative effort to continue making the Center Point-Urbana School District a great place to live, work, and educate students. I will continue to share portions of my entry plan with all stakeholders in the forthcoming months along with being both transparent and communicative as the district's [next] superintendent.

Kadyn's Law-Iowa School Bus Safety

In 2012, the Iowa Legislature unanimously adopted Kadyn's law. The law was in response to the death of seven year old named Kadyn Jade Halverson who was struck by a pickup and killed while trying to cross the road to board a school bus.

The driver of the pickup violated Iowa's stop arm law which prohibits drivers from passing a stopped school bus when the stop arms are out, or when the red or amber lights are flashing.

Kadyn's law increased the criminal penalties for passing a stopped school bus and increased the license sanctions for these offenses. Under Kadyn's law an individual who is convicted of failing to stop for a School Bus Stop Arm will be subjected to the following punishment for unlawful passing of a school bus under Iowa Code section 321.372(5)(b):

First Offense – A fine of at least \$250.00 but not more than \$675.00, and/or imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, and a 30 day license suspension.

Second Offense – (in five years) A fine of at least \$315.00, but not more than \$1,875.00, and/or imprisonment not to exceed one year, and a 90 day license suspension.

Third Offense – (in five years) A fine of at least \$315.00, but not more than \$1,875.00, and/or imprisonment not to exceed one year, and a 180 day license suspension.

DO YOU KNOW WHEN STOPPING IS REQUIRED?

Meeting the bus from the front: When you see amber warning lights flashing you must slow your vehicle to no more than 20 mph and be prepared to stop. Stop in front of the school bus when the school bus stops and its stop arm is extended. Remain stopped until the stop arm is retracted.

Approaching the bus from the rear: When you see flashing red or amber warning lights, you are not permitted to pass the school bus and should be prepared to stop. Stop behind the school bus when the school bus stops and the stop arm is extended. Stop no closer than 15 feet from the rear of the bus, and remain stopped until the stop arm is retracted and the school bus starts moving again.

All students entering into 12th grade will need proof of the meningococcal (ACWY) vaccine for meningitis. Meningitis can be a very serious and life threatening disease and is preventable with a vaccine.

Your child may already have had this vaccine for 12th grade. If this is the case, please send a copy of the vaccination to the school as soon as possible. If your child has not had the vaccine, please schedule an appointment with their doctor and send the record of the vaccination to the high school office.

Your child is required to have this vaccination when school starts and will not be able to start school without the documentation of the vaccines.

To all parents of Incoming 9th Graders,

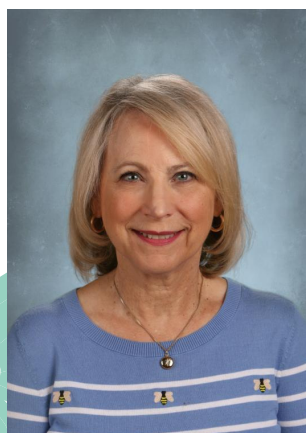

To all parents of Incoming 7th Graders,

All students entering into 7th grade will need proof of two separate immunizations this year. One is for the Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis) booster. The other is for the meningococcal (A,C,W,Y) vaccine. These diseases can be very serious and possibly life threatening, but are preventable with vaccines.

Your child may already have had these vaccines required for 7th grade. If this is the case, please send a copy of the vaccination to the school as soon as possible. If your child has not had the vaccinations, please schedule an appointment with his or her doctor and send the record of the vaccination to the middle school office.

Your child is required to have these vaccinations when school starts and will not be able to start school without the documentation of the vaccines.

23/24 MASTER SCHEDULE CHANGE

Thank you

First and foremost, thank you to Mrs. Boies, Mr. Jaquette, Mrs. Wolff, Mrs. Monson, Mrs. Vaupel, Mrs. Heitshusen, Ms. Salow, Ms. Teagle, and Mr. Brustkern for all of the hours of collaboration to create a new master schedule. I would also like to thank all the other staff that were great sounding boards as we worked through the process. I can't thank you enough.

Big Rocks

This past winter, this group of middle school staff started to look at our master schedule and improve our schedule by 1.) Increasing core minutes (Math, Science, Social Studies, Language Arts); 2.) make sure teachers have common planning time by content for collaborative teams; and 3.) make sure the schedule has time for interventions/extensions as it is part of our MTSS (multi-tiered system of supports).

Middle School

23/24 MASTER SCHEDULE CHANGE (Continued)

Increase of Core Minutes

Our current schedule has students in core classes 180 minutes a day with science and social studies rotating every 30 days. In essence, science and social studies are taught for half of the year. Next year's schedule will have science and social studies taught year round. I believe this is going to be great for our students as anytime we can get our students in front of great teachers, we all win. One of the obstacles with having science and social studies year round is that we have 4 core subjects and 5 sections. Our team's solution to this was to split our language arts classes into a Literature course and a Language course. Next year's schedule will reflect approximately 250 core instructional minutes.

Don't throw the baby out with the bath water

Any time you add something to the schedule, you have to take something out. It was very important to our team that we don't lose sight of educating the whole child and cutting opportunities for Exploratory courses. Currently, every student takes General Music, Wellness, Art, Computer Science, Physical Education, and Financial Literacy. These courses rotate every 35 days and PE is offered on a 5 day rotation. Next year, we are moving the Financial Literacy standards into the social studies curriculum. General Music, Art, and Wellness will be taught in a 60 day trimester while PE, Computer Science, and Guidance will rotate in on a six day rotation. This will allow us to keep all of our Exploratory classes and offer PE, Computer Science, and Guidance all year round. Even with all the classes rotating in, our students will get roughly the same amount of instructional minutes from our outstanding Exploratory teachers.

Trimesters

Don't fret. The change from quarters to trimesters really only impacts Exploratory courses and how we set up courses in Infinite Campus. We currently have 3 different schedules. LA and Math are on quarters, Science and Social Studies are on trimesters, and Exploratory courses rotate 5 times a year. Hopefully, the new schedule will bring some clarity around the schedule.

Middle School

Band/Choir

Our band and choir times won't have a drastic change. Both will continue to be offered, and they will rotate every other day like they do in the current format. We are working on how to continue to provide opportunities for Jazz band. We will continue to develop our students' talents and have strong music programs at the middle school.

WIN Time/ SDI/TAG

As part of MTSS, we will have 4 WIN (What I Need) times in the schedule. For flexibility purposes, one of the twenty minute WIN times will be the students' lunch time. The other 3 will be devoted to receiving TAG (Talented and Gifted) services, SDI (Specially Designed Instruction), and/or Intervention/Extension courses. These WIN times are in place to answer two questions: 1.) What do we do if a student doesn't learn it? 2.) What do we do if a student has learned it?

Change is Difficult

Change is not always fun. Never changing is down right scary. CPU Middle School has always tackled problems with a can do attitude. We will continue to make decisions based on what is best for all kids and live our mission statement.

Letter from the School Nurse:

Hello families of soon-to-be Kindergarteners!

As you start to make your summer plans, please take into consideration that all students entering Kindergarten are required by Iowa Law to have multiple health screenings as follows:

1. A valid VISION screening: between the time frame of one year prior to the start of Kindergarten until 6 months after Kindergarten has started.
2. A valid DENTAL screening: between the time frame of 3 years old until 4 months after Kindergarten has started.
3. Up to date “Kindergarten shots/immunizations” prior to school starting or exemptions.
4. A valid LEAD screening: completed by your student’s primary care provider anytime from birth through Kindergarten age. This is required - but the school does NOT need a copy of this screening.

Please consider making the necessary appointments to obtain the above listed screenings this spring or summer and cross this off your to do list! You will find the Vision Screening Form and Dental Screening Form on the CPU website Health & Nursing Services page at the very bottom. These completed/signed forms and immunization cards can be returned to CPU Primary School via mail, to myself via email, fax, at 2023/2024 “Meet and Greet,” or by sending it to school with your student once school has resumed.

Along with connecting our community, we also committed to ensuring we were good stewards of the PTO funds by balancing the spend on those events along with continuing to pursue some of the larger strategic initiatives. As we've mentioned in the PRIDE newsletters, we've been working closely with Ms. Tobiason to get closer to securing funding for the Primary Playground. The 2nd grade playground is overdue on being updated, and we want to ensure it continues to be a safe and fun place to play. With the current estimated year-end balance of approximately \$60,000, the PTO is looking to invest \$50,000 of that balance for the playground equipment to match the district contributions of \$50,000. Our current estimated expense for the playground is around \$250,000. With that gap, we are pursuing grant opportunities to help supplement and are looking into ways to partner with individuals and businesses in our community.
